2.14 Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC

Being the primary objective of the IQAC, by ensuring the quality enhancement, it functions as the nerve centre for guiding every constructive activity to substantiate our quality policies. The IQAC identifies the grey areas and suggest measure for improvement and sustenance of quality in every aspect of teaching and learning process.

Realizing the consistent increase in the number of admissions every year, IQAC suggested the management, through the principal regarding the infrastructure and well furnished class rooms. As a result, during the academic year the management has provisionally accepted the plan constructing few more class rooms.

Significant Activities and contributions made by IQAC – Contd.....

In spite of rural backgrounds, most of our students are unable to compete with the urban level students in public service commission's and other competitive examinations, IQAC in its meeting suggested to initiate a centre inside the premises to learn for competitive examinations and facilitate rural learners to be successful in national and state level competitive examinations.

Various requirements for the teaching faculties, such as furniture were supplied on the suggestion of the IQAC. The annual academic planner was prepared by the principal in consultation with IQAC. In addition, a separate communication cell was established with a team of 4 members to assist the staff members for their preparation of reports and proposals
